Fr. Anthony's Reflection

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord! The celebration of this day is a firm belief and proclamation of Jesus being the Lord and Savior of the whole world.

The joy of the birth of Jesus is still with us and the news has spread far and wide. When the news reached the three Magi from the East, they came to pay him homage, being guided by the star. Because this was an unusual star, they knew that it was pointing to something great. The King and Savior had been born! But, because Herod knew that he was the only King of the Jews, he was not happy with this news and the entire city of Jerusalem with him! The power and politics of domination seems to have been shaken at the news of the birth of the baby Jesus, who is going to reign in the heart of the universe in love and communion.

He is the true Savior preparing to save humanity from the darkness, in which it finds itself, and lead them into the light of Gods glory. He is the true liberator that the world was waiting for. How would people have known who he was ?

The three Magi were wise seekers representing humanity, seeking the meaning in life. In our world today, we may not be any different from the people of the time! Every day we seek meaning in life and true peace and liberation and we can only receive this when we seek the Lord. Let us also pray for the wisdom to identify the star and the road that leads us to the newborn King.

When we pay homage to the new born King, it is not only for his good but for our own good. The gifts of gold, myrrh and frankincense that we present, help us to identify him with ourselves. These gifts acquire new meaning in the different areas of humanity that are wealth, power and bodily pleasure. These three gifts offered to the child Jesus with the intention of surrendering the three areas of humanity that may not necessarily bring fulfillment.

Like the Magi, may we also seek the new born King Jesus and pay homage to him. Amen.

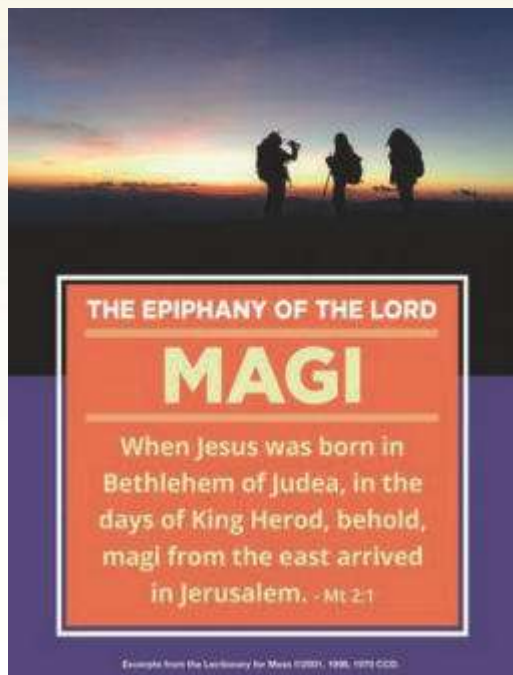

Liturgy Corner

There are visitors in our midst with this celebration! The magi join our Nativity scene in the church. "Today's solemnity of the Epiphany continues the celebration of the astonishing mystery of God's manifestation to the very ends of the earth. The visitors from the east symbolize the extent of God's salvation as it unfolds for people of every land. As they offer gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, gifts fitting for a king, they announce to the world that an astonishing event has taken place; all peoples will know the glory of God."

"As the foreigners from the East are led to the infant Christ, by a star in today's Gospel, we see the mysterious ways in which God arranges for an "epiphany" (a manifestation or showing) of Christ to the world. The love of God's glory shines forth in Christ our Light, through whom we are renewed and remade in God's image and likeness. How can you be a light of love for all nations and all peoples?" (LTP Sourcebook)

May we all be most blessed this New Year as we welcome 2021 and pray that this year will be filled with healing, an end to the pandemic, as well as abundant peace and joy. It is interesting that foreigners, non believers were some of the first to see and pay homage to the newborn King - the Prince of Peace. They bestow upon him the gifts of gold - honoring his role as King, frankincense - honoring his role as Priest, and myrrh - honoring his ultimate destiny in Jerusalem - his death of a cross and burial.

Matthew illustrates that this special child is the fulfillment of the prophets, meant to accomplish marvelous things as the prophet Micah describes "the shepherd of Israel". The example of the Magi share with us that God is not found without leaving the routine and going beyond the normal. We must be persistent as the Magi in our pursuit of the presence of God in our lives.

May this New Year and this celebration of the Epiphany bring us to a greater presence of God in our lives and may we share our God given gifts with others to bring that presence alive in their lives.



Welcome!

As we gather again for the celebration of Mass, we are all asked to do our part to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Out of an abundance of caution for others gathered, please be aware, prior to entering the church, an usher will ask you a series of questions. Please be patient and wait for their instructions regarding seating, as we must comply with social distancing guidelines. We ask that everyone takes the following precautions:

- Stay home if you are ill, elderly, anxious, or immunocompromised. Bishop Knestout has dispensed all Catholics in the Diocese from their Sunday Mass obligation. **Our virtual Mass is at 10am!**
- Maintain six feet of social distance from others who are not from the same household at all times while in the church or on church property.
- All those ages 5 and up and those to receive Communion must wear a face mask or face covering. Be sure the mask covers your nose and mouth.
- Refrain from physical contact, such as holding hands during the Our Father and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace.
- Sanitize hand when entering and leaving church. Bring personal supply of hand sanitizer to use before receiving Communion, if possible.
- Consider receiving Holy Communion in the hand.

If you have a fever or symptoms of COVID-19 or not wearing a facemask, you will not be permitted to enter the building.

Saint John Neumann's Story

Perhaps because the United States got a later start in the history of the world, it has relatively few canonized saints, but their number is increasing.

John Neumann was born in what is now the Czech Republic. After studying in Prague, he came to New York at 25 and was ordained a priest. He did missionary work in New York until he was 29, when he joined the Redemptorists and became its first member to profess vows in the United States. He continued missionary work in Maryland, Virginia and Ohio, where he became popular with the Germans.

At 41, as bishop of Philadelphia, he organized the parochial school system into a diocesan one, increasing the number of pupils almost twentyfold within a short time. Gifted with outstanding organizing ability, he drew into the city many teaching communities of sisters and the Christian Brothers. During his brief assignment as vice provincial for the Redemptorists, he placed them in the forefront of the parochial movement.

Well-known for his holiness and learning, spiritual writing and preaching, on October 13, 1963, John Neumann became the first American bishop to be beatified. Canonized in 1977, he is buried in St. Peter the Apostle Church in Philadelphia.

A Saint Story

Elizabeth Ann Bayley was born in New York City on August 28, 1774 to a prominent Episcopal family, and lost her mother at the age of three. In 1794, at the age of 19, Elizabeth married William Magee Seton, a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. William died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving Elizabeth a young widow. After discovering Catholicism in Italy, where her husband had died, Elizabeth returned to the United States and entered the Catholic Church in 1805 in New York.



After a number of difficult years, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph's, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, planting the seeds of Catholic education in the United States. Her legacy now includes religious congregations in the United States and Canada, whose members work on the unmet needs of people living in poverty in North America and beyond.

Mother Seton, as she is often called, was canonized on Sunday, September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI. She was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "Saint." Her remains are entombed in Emmitsburg in the Basilica at the National Shrine that bears her name.
